

Pacem as a Garden

Last fall, the staff at Pacem in Terris spent time reflecting on how Pacem is a garden, and the growth that God brings to all who encounter this sacred place. In our chapel is a large painting by



fresco artist Mark Balma. The painting is titled, "From the Garden: Darkness into Light." It made for a fitting point of focus as we reflected on the gardens found in Scripture – the Garden of Eden, the Garden of Gethsemane, the Garden of Golgotha or Christ's entombment, and the Garden of Paradise. All of Salvation History, as it were, takes place in a garden.

In our faith journeys, while at Pacem we're merely planting seeds, but it's God who waters them and gives the growth. Christ is the gardener who waters, and fertilizes, who prunes, and harvests. When we make time for Christ, especially in the silence and solitude of a hermitage, we often find that radical pruning takes place. In the sanctuary of the hermitage, we face ourselves and we face God. In that encounter, authentic transformation occurs.

Pacem Hires Director of Philanthropy

Phyllis' history includes 20 years of working directly for, or in support of, non-profits, most recently sharing tools and resources with those who seek additional funding. She understands "philanthropy" as the gift it is for all of us to share our time, our talent, and – yes – our finances. Her gifts and talents have been developed through her experiences as a Life Coach, non-profit Executive Director, sales representative, and volunteer with organizations that transform lives.

A member of the Church of St. Peter Claver in St. Paul, and married to Stuart Goldbarg, she also shares in the life of Mt. Zion Hebrew Congregation, a Reform Jewish congregation in St. Paul. Faith exploration has taken her into a multitude of faith communities, equipping her for this ministry to hermits from all faith traditions, who seek to be alone with God.

Through her own experience as a Pacem hermit, her perspective is that, when people come to Pacem in Terris, they are "coming home." She adds, "It takes courage to intentionally stand before God and say 'Here I am,' and be willing to wait for God's in-kind reply. Whether it's God seeking us or us seeking God, it is love seeking love. There is no better place to be and no better work to do than expand the opportunity for others to experience this sacred place where people can be alone with God."

One of her first actions is that of sending a weekly e-mail communication to hermits who have expressed a commitment to pray for those who are staying in the very hermitages in which they stayed. This is one way of connecting past and present hermits, and Phyllis invites your partnership in exploring ways to support Pacem's ministry in service of hermits-yet-to-come.

Linda Schreurs Memorial Fund

Through the generosity of the Linda Schreurs' family, The Linda Schreurs Memorial Fund has been created. Linda was not only a frequent hermit guest at Pacem in Terris, but also brought many other guests to the peace that can be found here. She coordinated groups of women who came from lowa, sometimes 2-3 times per year to meet God in the silence and the solitude of the hermitage. A true missionary, apostle, and evangelist, she brought countless numbers into a deeper relationship with the Lord – as many as 30 or 40 groups in total. On August 28, 2018, Linda entered her eternal reward after a long-term battle with pancreatic cancer.



At the request of her husband, Michael, and their daughters Celine, Sarah, and Claire, donations were received from the family, from those who wanted to honor Linda, and from her ministry, *Intimacy with God Ministries*. We are most grateful to Michael and the family for considering Pacem.

The Fund has been established to cover the shortfall of hermit guests who are not able to make the full recommended offering of \$115 for their one-night hermitage stay. The Fund will continue the love that Linda had for bringing others to "come be alone with God," by making it possible for those who might otherwise be unable to "come and rest a while." Through the Fund, Linda's ministry will continue, extending her reach beyond geography to others who hunger and thirst for time alone with the Lord. May she rest in peace and let perpetual light shine upon her.

How Will You Help Sustain Pacem?

In a garden you need a gardener and a few simple tools. Think big. On a farm, you need many farm hands to care for the land, the equipment, and providing regular maintenance. There are daily, monthly, quarterly practices, without which the harvest is at risk. And it takes money to buy feed, repair the fence line, and replace the combine when it breaks.

Now think Pacem. There are things God does, and there are things we do. God does indeed plant, water, fertilize, prune and harvest. God did not ask us to go find the "people", rather, God originally asked Shirley "to create an environment where my people can be alone with me." Consider that it is we who receive a call to sustain this sacred space.

Like the garden and the farm, Pacem's magnificent 240 acres (wildlife, marshland, prairie, forest, lake, buildings, and equipment) require a great deal of tender loving care in support of our hermit guests, not to mention unanticipated expenses.

At the end of 2018, I made a single donation (which thankfully will be matched by my former employer). In 2019, I intend to make a monthly donation that will more than double my 2018 contribution, honoring my commitment to sustain Pacem in Terris for future guests.
